6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

As ours is a affiliating college therefore, it follows the curriculum designed by the BOS of the respective subjects. However, every department prepares its annual plan and makes every effort to implement it in a given time schedule. However, our faculties Dr. M.N. Biradar, Dr. U.L. Deshmukh and Dr. S.S. Pawar are member BOS in their respective subjects and contribute to the development and revision, if any, of the curriculum.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Along with the conventional methods of teaching, most of the faculties adopt some innovative methods of teaching such as use of Audio-Visual Aids, LCD projector, etc. Besides, project work, tutorials, Home assignments, study tours are also adopted as a part of TL process. Most of the faculties belonging to science faculty use ICT classrooms which are equipped with modern technology of TL.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The college adopted continuous internal assessment method to assess the performance of students by means of internal tests, project works, Home assignments and tutorials etc. The answers in time and the performance is conveyed to the students. Lacunas, if any, are removed by taking necessary measures. Most of the faculties contribute to evaluation process conducted by the university as examiners moderators, also as JCS and flying squad members for the smooth conduct of examinations.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- Teachers are encouraged to undertake research activity.
- They are provided with all the necessary facilities like book and equipments.
- Teachers are provided on duty leave facility to participate in refresher/ orientation/ seminars/ conferences/ workshops.
- Students are encouraged to participate in various co-curriculum extracurricular and extension activities also.
- As of now, 05 faculties in our college have voluntarily registered their names as research guides.
- Most of the faculties have complete their research work M.Phil or Ph.D. in their service tenure and are guiding students in research related activities.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- Physical infrastructure has been improved and extended.
- More number of latest books and Journals are added to the library.
- Computerization of the library is in process.
- Adequate number of equipments are purchased to meet the needs.
- The college has developed the facilities such as sports accommodation for girl students in the campus, administrative Block on Ist floor, staff toilet, new classrooms and laboratories for science stream, the adequate computing facility with internet connectivity in library, office, and computer laboratory, bigger black boards, sufficient books in the library, etc and ICT enabled seminar hall.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The management of available human resources is done in the following ways:

- For the management of students' affairs the college has a students council, the members of the same takes care of their needs.
- There are separate associations of teaching and non-teaching staff. These associations look after the matters of teaching and non-teaching staff members. Besides these, there is a governing body that manages and develops the total human resource of the college. The objective is to make optimum use of available human resource.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The recruitment of teaching and non-teaching staff is made purely on the academic merit following the norms of the affiliating university, UGC and state government.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The department of COC and Commerce have established collaboration with local institutions and Banking sectors. The college plans to establish string collaboration for research with research centres of the neighbouring institutions and also with the university departments. The institution-industry collaboration is on anvil.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

7. Innovations and Best Practices

7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.

The college aims to provide quality education by offering the students innovative as well as skill oriented courses, along with the conventional one, therefore, the college has prepared a strategic plan in which long term and short-term goals are fixed and action plans are implemented systematically. Following are the innovations introduced and implemented in the college during this year.

- Introduction of 02 UGC career oriented courses.
- Introduction of 03 short term certificate courses on the life and works of Lord Buddha, Mahatma Gandhi and Jawaharlal Nehru.

The objectives of the courses is to acquaint the students with skill oriented courses and the ideals and path breaking revolutionary works of these ideal leaders of India.

The college with the help of concerned departments designed the syllabus for these courses. 30-40 students are enrolled for each course. At the end of the course, the performance of students is assessed on the basis of written examination. The students are benefitted with a certificate which will be fruitful in their future career.

Best practice No. 1

Title: Distribution of Merit Prizes to students:

Goal:

To inspire a competitive mentality and to motivate the students to secure more marks than his/her peers in the vicinity in the university examinations. This will indirectly motivate the students to get more marks in the examinations.

Content/Practice:

Immediately after the publication of university results a list of students (Boys & Girls), who have secured 60% and more marks, is prepared. The top most two students who have scored I & II rank in the order of merit from each stream are selected as eligible candidates for the scheme of award of cash prize with a certificate of honour. These prizes are distributed to them in a programme at the hands of chief guests. The scheme is instituted and sponsored by the founder president of our parent institution Late Bhujangrao Patil Kinhalkar. He deposited the amount of Rs. 46542/- in a bank as a fixed deposit. The interest earned on the same is utilized to offer cash prizes for meritorious students after the names of his father and mother Viz.-

- Late Satwaji Patil Kinhalkar Prize (for Boys)
- Late Manjulabai Patil Kinhalkar Prize (for Girls)

Evidence of Success:

This scheme was started with a grand motto and got great response. The beneficiaries of the scheme are in increasing trend from its beginning, and thus, in turn, helped in sustaining the momentum in achieving bright success in university examinations.

Problems faced and Resources required:

Equitable distribution of prizes among the students of each faculty is not possible.

Best practice No. 2

Title: Guest Lectures and Workshops:

Guest lectures and workshops are conducted by almost all the departments to enrich students Knowledge.

Goal:

To equip the students with the current and practical knowledge to enhance the presentation skills of the students.

Content/Practice:

Every department volunteerily organizes guest lectures and workshop by drawing eminent academicians/ experts as resource persons. These programmes are planned in advance so as to optimize the resources without duplication and benefitting the most. All the activities are organized without disturbing regular academic schedule.

Evidence of Success:

During last five years the departments of Sociology, Political Science, Hindi, History and Economics have organized national seminars seeking the required financial assistance from UGC and the college.

The feedback received from the students and staff members encourage the continuance of the scheme.

Problems encountered and Resources required:

Inadequacy and/or non-availability of funds required poses problems since the college does not receive non-salary grants from the state government.

The college campus has enough greenery with ample number of trees. The department of NSS takes care of making the campus verdant by planting samplings every year. The saplings are watered manually and also by drip irrigation system. The NSS volunteers take care of maintaining the campus eco-friendly.
